	above accommodation website for the earliest move-in dates and latest

move out dates for on campus accommodation. The arrival dates may be subject to change. An earlier arrival date is subject to availability. Note that the housing contract starts earlier than the semester and you do not need to arrive as early as the housing opens. We recommend arriving just a day or two before the International Welcome, as this is when most students arrive. Semester 2 students cannot arrive too early as there is a tight turnaround time between Semester 1 students leaving and Semester 2 students arriving. See the move-in date on the website of the Study Abroad and Exchange accommodation offer below. Application deadlines: 1 December for a Semester 1 (February) 2023 start, or 1 May for a Semester 2 (July) 2023 start. Applications received after these dates are subject to availability. You are also required to apply before the appropriate deadline and return all subsequent accommodation contracts by the required deadlines in order to secure the room if available. ## **Medical and Travel Insurance**

Compulsory medical and travel	Exchange students <b>must</b> have appropriate and current medical and travel
insurance	insurance while studying in New Zealand. UC requires all enrolled
	international students on campus to have approved health and travel insurance for the duration of their enrolment (regardless of their visa type). This is a requirement under the Education (Pastoral Care of Tertiary and International Learners) Code of Practice 2021.

The Studentsafe Inbound University Policy by Allianz Partners is UC's preferred medical and travel insurance for international students. Exchange students can purchase Studentsafe Inbound University Policy when they complete their enrolment in person on campus.

If exchange students hope to utilise an alternative insurance policy, they must apply to the Enrolment team at the UC to have the cover assessed at least four weeks before enrolment to determine whether it meets the minimum requirements for a travel and medical insurance policy. The application form for insurance assessment is available on the web page above. It is important to note that many overseas insurance policies do not meet New Zealand requirements and students need to be aware that a policy required by their home university or issued in their home country may not necessarily meet New Zealand requirements and that purchase of the default insurance at enrolment may be required.
