Academic information

Academic entry requirements

To apply to study on European exchange you must:

- Be nominated by your home university to study on an exchange agreement
- Have achieved a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or over on a 4.0 scale OR equivalent (B average) OR ECTS 'C' at your home university

You must also:

- Provide a strong personal statement
- Provide evidence of your written and spoken English skills if English is not your first language
- Provide a transcript (Applicants to the College of Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences will be required to provide a transcript at the point of application demonstrating they have completed a minimum of one full year of study at their home institution. Where one full year has not yet been completed, study at a previous institution will be considered on a case-by-case basis. Applicants to the College of Science and Engineering will be required to provide a transcript demonstrating that they have completed 1 semester of study).

Looking for courses

You should select at least two thirds of your courses in the subject area of the agreement you have been nominated on. It may be possible to take one course per semester outside of this subject area.

To enroll in courses you must meet the prerequisites stated in the Course Finder. We will aim to place you in your preferred courses but cannot guarantee that this will be possible.

Modern language exchange

If you are applying under a Modern European Languages exchange, you will probably be studying English at your home university. You can therefore take a variety of courses here in Edinburgh. You will still be expected to take two thirds of your courses in the College of Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences.

Entry into honours level courses

Year 3 and Year 4 courses are called honours courses.

All honours level classes have strict academic prerequisites and in some subjects there are limited places available. For enrolment in many honours courses, we require visiting students to have completed at least three or four previous courses in the relevant subject area, achieving a grade B or above (or equivalent).

Entry to honours course is not guaranteed; however we will aim to place you in your preferred course.

Popular subject areas

Though we endeavor to ensure that majority of our students are allocated their preferred course choices, sometimes this is not possible.

Some subject areas cannot guarantee access to students who are not on a direct exchange in the subject area, either because these subjects are high-pressure (very popular courses with limited capacity and strict pre-requisites) or because they have limited study options available for visiting students. Programmes and courses not open to exchange students

(Unless you are coming on an exchange agreement within these subject areas)

Credit system

Under the semester system the majority of our courses will be 20 credit (Semester) or 40 credit (Year) courses. Students are expected to take the normal academic load of 60 credits per semester.

- 2 Edinburgh credits = 1 ECTS

Students are not permitted to take more than 60 credits per semester and cannot normally take fewer credits.

Please note that the last opportunity to add or drop courses will be the end of the 2nd teaching week and no changes will be allowed after that.

Transcripts

An academic transcript will normally be issued by the end of the following February (for semester one students) and by the end of the following August (for semester two and full-year students).

Certificate of Arrival and Departure and Learning Agreements

Our Visiting Student Offices will sign and verify any documentation required to ensure you receive Erasmus funding from your home university. This includes Erasmus Learning Agreements and Certificates of Attendance/Enrolment/Departure. You can send them before your arrival to the relevant team by email.

Before submitting your Erasmus documents please make sure you have accepted an offer to study on European exchange at Edinburgh. It is your responsibility to return the signed documents to your home institution.

Application process

Your home university will need to nominate you.

When we have successfully processed your nomination we will send you an email inviting you to apply online to the University of Edinburgh.

You must apply online to the University of Edinburgh as well as being nominated by your home university.

To apply you should create an online account with us.

You will get a username and a password, which will allow you to track your application through its various stages.

You will need to upload copies of an official transcript (which lists all courses undertaken and grades received at your home university, to date) and a personal statement.

European exchange students are not required to submit an academic reference.

Application deadlines

Applications must be submitted by the following deadlines:

- **31 May** for students starting in September
- **31 October** for students starting in January

Late applications will not be considered.

Please allow **6-8 weeks** for us to process your application.

If you need a response before July (September start) or November (January start) to meet your home university or our Accommodation deadlines, please apply by early May or early October.

English language requirements

As a nominated European exchange student you should have already achieved a good level of English equivalent to B2 in the Common European Framework of Reference for language (CEFR).

You may be required to provide us with evidence of your English language ability if you are not from a majority English speaking country, and:

1. You will study with us on a Student Route visa or/and;
2. You wish to take third or fourth year level courses outside the subject area of your European exchange agreement.

Visa requirements

Standard Visitor route

If you are coming to the UK for a programme that is less than six months in length, and you do not wish to work (including work placements) or extend your studies in the UK, you can apply to come to the UK as a Standard Visitor:

If you are a 'Visa National', then you will need to apply for a visa before you travel to the UK. The list of 'Visa Nationals' is here:

Visa Nationals will need to make their application online, and submit their biometric information (their finger prints and digital photo) at their nearest Visa Application Centre.

If your country of nationality is **not** on the above list, then you are a 'Non-Visa National'.

Non-Visa National students will not need to apply for a visa in advance under the Standard Visitor Route. Most Non-Visa Nationals will need to meet with a Border Force official on their arrival to the UK and get a stamp in their passport.

Studying for longer than six months

For students coming for longer than six months you will need to apply via the Student Route:

Electronic Travel Authorisation (ETA)

The Electronic Travel Authorisation (ETA) scheme applies to non-visa national visitors coming without a visa (for 6 months or less).

Accommodation application deadlines

The deadlines for accommodation applications are as follows:

- **31 July** for all students starting in September
- **30 November** for all students starting in January

Full year European exchange students are guaranteed accommodation, provided your application is submitted by the deadline.

Please note that we cannot guarantee that you will be offered the accommodation you ask for.

Semester Only students

Students here for a single semester are **not** guaranteed accommodation. However we would advise that you still submit a university accommodation application in case there are spaces left.

Please do not rely on being allocated a spot in University accommodation. If there are no rooms available, you will need to look for private accommodation.

Finding semester only private accommodation in Edinburgh can be difficult, therefore students should be prepared to spend time researching their housing options.

Health & personal insurance

All students on a full-time course of studies in Scotland are eligible for National Health Service (NHS) treatment. If you are studying here full time as a visiting student on the Standard Visitor Route and you experience an illness or accident, you will be able to access NHS treatment. This is provided for free, however, you may have to pay for dentistry and some more specialised services.

However, it must not be your intention to access healthcare when you travel.

We advise that students take out adequate travel insurance which includes a medical component and also protection to cover personal items, such as baggage, books, personal computers, etc.

If you have a pre-existing medical condition, we strongly advise that you contact the Disability and Learning Support Service which will be able to provide advice and support about treatment and medication:

You should research the options available to you and select the insurance policy which is most suited to your situation.

If you are coming via the Student Route you will pay a fee for this visa which includes a health surcharge and therefore you would be covered for NHS treatment for the duration of your studies.

A level of content insurance is included in the rent for students who are in university accommodation. For more information:
