In addition to being a nationally ranked top-tier research institution, the University of New Hampshire is also a land-grant institution and a designated land-, sea- and space-grant institution. The University is comprised of five colleges, dozens of academic departments, interdisciplinary institutes, and research centers that attract students and faculty from around the world. New state-of-the-art facilities are being constructed to support academic growth, and new residences and dining halls have been built to meet the growing popularity of campus life. The University rests lightly on the site of old Ben Thompson's farm, where some 15,000 students and hundreds of faculty and staff live and work amid the lush forests, rolling hills, and riverbeds of one of the most beautiful campuses in the nation.
